If you missed the school's performance of Beauty and the Beast, you missed an amazing show.


Nearly 80 kids in 3rd-12th grades put together a production that left so many of us speechless. The spring concert held this year at All Saint's Episcopal Church was a fantastic culmination of vocal and instrumental musicianship. Students also participated in local art shows, winning prestigious awards in the community. The 4th and 5th graders participated in the Shasta County Spelling Bee, the first in many year. Sienna Belong was a finalist, qualifying her for the State Bee.



RCS athletes have represented the school well with character and quality of play in the 2018-19 school year. Elementary cross country had a record number of participants and completed well. Middle School volleyball teams had great seasons with the 8th graders winning our league. Seventh and eighth grade basketball teams placed and won tournaments this winter as well. Girls softball finished undefeated and in 1st place for our middle school. High School varsity volleyball won the Fall River and Los Molinos tournaments as part of their trail to the NorCal section semi-finals. The 8-man football team came up two points short of a win in the section semi-finals game. The girls' softball team made it all the way to the section championships too. If we were to keep going, we would be here all day. Needless to say, our kids had a remarkable year in athletics.





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RCS TESTING RESULTS


Redding Christian School utilizes varied approaches to measuring student learning outcomes. Within the daily practice of classrooms are the constant and intentional focus on being academically excellent, effective communicators, responsible citizens all while pursuing spiritual growth. These are documented quarterly with the RCS ESLR rubric. The results of ESLR evaluations can include modifications to instructional and assessment strategies, improved technological integration, classroom management initiatives, and many more aspects of the teaching learning environment designed to improve student understanding.

RCS also administers nationally normed tests: PSAT and Terra Nova 3. There are other tests that teachers and administration prepare students to take such as the SAT, ACT, AMC 10 & 12, and the Far Northern CA Science Bowl. Preparation includes awareness of testing strategies, content and format of exams, all while keeping a Christian worldview perspective on how these assessments are a litmus test to current academic standing as it relates to finding and pursuing God's will in their lives.

<u>Terra Nova (Kindergarten—8th grade)</u>

Terra Nova tests are administered in the spring of every year to all students in K-8th grades. Faculty use time during early fall professional development to look at each grade level and subject matter as part of the transitional planning occurring between grade levels. They identify trends, drilling down to include individual student's scores in each subcategory. For example, the 6th grade has experienced lower than expected results year-after year. Sixth grade is often a year with above average transition of students in and out of RCS. When digging deeper into the data and individual sub-scores, students new to RCS often times had minor gaps that manifested in lower overall testing averages. Those gaps are identified and by 8th grade the overall score averages have increased.

As an example, below is an overview of the 2018 testing results for RCS 6th graders, 2019 were not yet available. NP of Mean NCE means the national percentile based on that year's national averages. The top line shows that RCS 6th graders had an average score better than 75% of all other 6th graders who took the Reading test in 2018. Our Total Score was the 82nd percentile, meaning our average is better than 82% of all test takers.



SAT/ACT TESTING RESULTS

SAT

The SAT has undergone significant change since the beginning of 2016. No longer are students required to complete the writing/essay component, and instead the mechanics of writing are assessed through the other two components; Critical Reading and Mathematics. These past years continue to see RCS students scoring higher than both the state and national averages. Among college bound seniors in California and across the nation taking the




SAT test, RCS has demonstrated their competitive academic standing. Typically, the higher the percentage of the student body who take standardized tests, the lower the overall average tends to be. The SAT is a voluntary test in California with about 60% of students taking the test yielding a combined average of 1080 on a 1600 point scale. With 85% of RCS high school students taking the SAT, the seniors averaged 1120 this year, above the state and national averages.

According to the College Board, SAT test takers who meet or exceed the Evidence-Based Reading and Writing (ERW) or Math benchmarks on the exam have a 75% chance of earning at least a C or better in a first-semester, credit-bearing course in history, literature, social science, writing, algebra, statistics, pre-calculus, or calculus. National averages have 48% of test takers meeting both benchmarks, California is at 41%, and RCS comes in with an overall average of 62% meeting both benchmarks.

PSAT

All Sophomores and Juniors at Redding Christian School take the PSAT every October. For students with ISP and 504 plans, accommodations are requested through the College Board and administered as such. Pursuing excellence in academics includes preparation for nationally normed testing. Almost every college and university in the nation will accept the SAT as part of the admission process. Additionally, with the increased exposure to Common Core Standards and the close association between those standards and the SAT suite of assessments, RCS has chosen to focus efforts on preparing for these tests in addition to the school's curriculum standards.

Preparation for the PSAT includes formal introductions for all 10th and 11th graders during part of their school day classes, email communications and both online and physical resources provided to parents, and specific curricular concepts and problems discussed and evaluated in Math and English classes. Middle and High School teachers have taken the PSAT during professional development time, evaluated specific forms and styles of questions, content, and trends in an effort to use similar language, format, and where necessary, added content to further assist in assessment preparation. Recent changes and additions in courses has been the recognition by History and Science teachers of the need to include more charts and graphs as a means for interpreting trends and evaluating concepts. Math teachers at the middle school level have started using more function notation earlier in the application of linear equations. English teachers are using past PSAT questions as reading evaluations. PSAT Benchmarks for Evidence-Based Reading and Writing for RCS are above national averages every year.
